The school is committed to educating the students in social justice and Renae and Anna wanted to 'walk the talk'. They were looking for a project in some part of the world, Renae thought of Vietnam, Anna of the Philippines.

specifically the Manuel Duato School for children with special needs and disabilities of various kinds.

The whole school, principal, board and parents got behind the project to buy a bus to transport the children to the school. The Manuel Duato School is an initiative of the Columban Fathers who

have worked in the area for 60 years, especially among the people who have left the countryside looking for a better life in the city.

The fundraising at St Christopher's was concentrated on the Peru project and when Renae and Anna went to visit Manuel Duato in September, the primary school and friends had raised \$28,000.

The generosity of the children, parents and those associated with the project has been extraordinary.

We hope to send two more teachers to Lima in 2012, hopefully with a similar amount of money.

Visiting, seeing and experiencing is the only way to understand in some small way how the Peruvian people live.

The October 2010 issue of *The Far East* featured a 4 page souvenir pullout featuring the first cover the *The Far East*, photos of Columban Martyrs and other significant events.

There have only been 6 Editors of *The Far East* including the current Editor Fr Gary Walker.

Celebrating 40 years

On July 4, 1970 Fr Warren Kinne, Fr Robert McCulloch and I were ordained. It happens to all of us who stay around! It is not that we are celebrating our achievements. Who knows what they are? However, it does provide me with a vantage point to look back over the terrain that we have covered so far.

I am very conscious of being carried by a strong current called the Columbans. I would never have found myself in such deep water or in such interesting places if I had not been caught up in this flood!

Out of the 14 young men who started spiritual Year at Sassafras on March 1, 1964, we had 12 gather at St Columbans in Essendon for a Mass and a meal on the August 1.

The intermingling of our lives cannot be undone. We are who we are now because of all those we have known. It is a wonderful thing.

Columban visits ‘Camp Hope’

During the rescue effort to free 33 miners in the San José mine near Copiapó in Northern Chile, Columban Fr Alvaro Martinez went to ‘Camp Hope’ with a television crew to do a report for the program, *‘The Paths of the Church’*.

He spoke with the families of the miners about how their religious faith helped them deal with waiting and hoping for the rescue of the miners. On the streets of the mining ‘Camp Hope’, he said that one could feel the anxiety of just waiting for the rescue. Each person, relatives and miners, could feel the hammering of the machines that broke the rock in search of the trapped men. This banging provoked both anxiety and hope. It also created tension between people, as did a variety of circumstances of this temporary living arrangement.

Fr Alvaro asked Alonso Contreras, cousin of Carlos, one of the trapped miners – “What happened in the mine? How have those men united and kept themselves going through their faith in God?” He told me that there was one miner who was a man of faith and piety, who had been a messenger of hope for all the trapped men. He awakened the desire to look at God in the darkness 700 metres down and find the light of the Risen One. One of the trapped miners did not believe in God, but in one of the first telephone conversations he told his cousin, “I have found God and believe God exists”.

The miners were rescued on October 12 and 13.

Creating community in Negros

Last year I visited Fr Brian Gore in Bantolinao in the mountains of Negros Occidental in the Visayas, Philippines. Brian recently returned to Negros where he is implementing the work of the Negros Nine Human Development Foundation (NNHDF).

The Negros Nine were three priests and six lay workers who were imprisoned in 1983 during the Marcos regime and sentenced to death on trumped up murder charges. Brian and Lydio (Boy) Mangao are two of the nine who have helped begin the NNHDF.

Their purpose is to help form and strengthen Christian Communities, organic cooperatives and people's organizations. The people who live in the mountains live a very frugal existence. The children walk seven kilometers to Oringao for primary school or stay in town during the week for high school. Among the farmers living a subsistence lifestyle with few farming skills, there has been limited food production.

The NNHDF purchased land on the side of the mountain, then began an organic demonstration farm with a multi-purpose building. The farm was developed with contouring, pasture grasses, fish ponds, food crops, a worm farm, a plant nursery, livestock and carabao which are hired out for ploughing. Local farmers came and learned about biodiversity and organic farming and pretty soon, a co-operative was formed.

The co-op now has 114 members from communities around the farm. They meet there to plan income generating projects. Farmers gain individual benefits, but the communal benefits stay in the co-operative to continue improvements on the farm.
