Traffic and chaos

Fr Joe Ruys reflects on his time with the people of Peru.

Recently, I was driving along a local street with Australian friends who sighed, "if only we had brought along our cameras. The people at home would never believe the traffic and the chaos.

It is the desperateness that first strikes the visitor. People driving broken down cars, people pushing carts, bikes or anything with wheels so that they can move loads.

Another example of frustration was our attempt to upgrade one of our humble Chapels. For over a year I have been trying to engage the local community in a discussion to determine what they would like to see happen. The community are desperately poor and lack confidence in expressing their ideas, especially with a priest.



Certainly there is madness about the way of life here in Lima, but I think it could be better described as desperateness and chaos caused by poverty and necessity.

An example of desperateness is a mother who has three children, her husband has left her and her child gets sick. She takes a day off work and takes the child to the doctor who tells her that she needs to go to the hospital. At the hospital she is told that the child needs to be observed but medication must be purchased prior to admittance.

After our 'final' meeting, I contacted the builders that all was set to begin. One person, then another awkwardly suggested that the building really wasn't what they wanted as it was not going to help them achieve their dream of building a permanent Chapel.

During the week I tried to put aside my disappointment and frustration. I have to recognize the people's great hope and optimism that one day they will achieve what I see as virtually an impossible dream.

Palliative care in Pakistan

In preparation for palliative care to begin in Pakistan, we have sent one of the male nurses from St Elizabeth Hospital to do the year-long Certificate in Palliative Care Nursing at Calvary-Bethlehem Hospital, Caulfield. He will return to Pakistan in November.

Meantime another nurse has just completed his specialized Certificate in Pediatric Nursing in Hyderabad

and has commenced a month-long course in Pediatric Oncological Nursing at the Children Cancer Hospital in Karachi.

The home-based palliative care that is starting at St Elizabeth Hospital is a first in Pakistan so we don't have specific local expertise to fall back on. However, a group of four senior Catholic nurses with academic positions in universities and schools of nursing in Karachi have come together as the Nursing Advisory Service for planning and implementing the palliative care at St Elizabeth. One has had experience in oncological nursing, and all bring a focused professional perspective to the new venture.

We have already begun sourcing the necessary equipment and raising funds for some of the equipment which is expensive, made more so by the refusal of the Pakistan government to grant any sort of sales tax concession to St Elizabeth.

We plan to begin with ten terminally-ill patients being visited at home in the morning and evening. We look forward to being "in action" in the first months of 2012.

Bus will make a difference

Manuel Duato, a Columban founded school for children with disabilities, has among its 200 students, 27 students with wheelchairs.

Their parents struggle daily to get their children to classes. Drivers are reluctant to have the extra work of lifting a disabled person and the wheelchair into and out of a taxi, let alone a crowded bus. Lima's public transport does not cater for people in wheelchairs.

I was deputed to look around for a bus properly adapted for wheelchairs. Our local bishop, kindly offered to help us bring in a duty free bus from overseas.

After three years of enquiries to Japan and the United States we bought a chassis from Lima for \$43,000. We had it delivered to a coach builder only a short distance from *Manuel Duato*.

The engineer is drawing up details of how to provide the best seating for the people and storage of wheelchairs. A lift for wheelchair and occupant is definitely part of the design.

Thanks to the long delay in finding a bus and the generosity of Columban benefactors, we had been able to put aside enough money to buy the chassis. It will cost another \$46,000 to complete the fit-out.

When the remaining funds are raised, our wheelchair dependent people will be able to travel with ease and safety.
