This resource explores the existing Catholic Lectionary to help us remember God's seamless gift of Life in all Creation – people within the natural world. It grows out of an Adelaide based ecumenical work led by Scripture scholar Dr Norman Habel.

Called 'A Catholic Season of Creation' it has four leaflets for the four Sundays of September. It explores the Sunday Lectionary and the gifts of forests, land, wilderness and water to help us hear the voice of earth as a voice of God.

Our Sunday worship is a great place to start if we want to grow a better recognition of the natural world in God's plan of salvation in Jesus Christ. Linking the insights of ecology with Scripture deepens our appreciation of the way God acts in our lives.

The resource will be sent electronically to Catholic parishes and other communities to use as an A3 bulletin cover. Parts of the resource can be used according to local needs.

Season of Creation

Rev Dr Norman Habel inspired an ecumenical group in Adelaide to initiate the Earth Bible Project and develop a Season of Creation for worship. It runs during the month of September leading up to celebration of the Feast of St Francis of Assisi October 4. Each of the four Sundays focuses on a particular gift. <http://seasonofcreation.com>

1. Forest
2. Land
3. Wilderness
4. Water

The group married Scripture with scientific insights about the natural world to rediscover the hidden voice of the Earth in the Bible. They developed a three year cycle of Scriptural Readings as a Creation Season Lectionary to help communal prayer. Catholic liturgists have yet to do this.

This resource explores the existing Catholic Lectionary to help us remember the seamless gift of God-given Life in all Creation – people within the natural world. We confess our arrogant abuses and make the search for God present. There needs to be an ecological conversion.

The Columban Centre for Peace Ecology and Justice previously created the 'Stations of the Forest' and 'Grace of Earth' linking Catholic faith and ecology.

Greeting

Today the Readings invite us to celebrate the Grace of being drawn into the circle of God given Life. We remember that the natural world begins that cycle. We are gifted to be members of the earth community and today let us give thanks particularly for trees, our brothers and sisters in creation, giving the oxygen we breathe. They provide wood for our houses and are home for wildlife. But let us also remember the times we have misused the forests in their diversity, a sign of how we have wronged other people in the cycle of life, and ask forgiveness.

Prayers of the Faithful

- That we will care for the diversity of forests as habitat for a diversity of plants and animals.
- That we will work to stop international debt forcing countries into unsustainable development and their citizens becoming environmental refugees.
- That we will not take the gift of clean air and clean water for granted but work to help the forests perform their natural services of cleansing.

Connecting Justice, Peace and Care for Earth (JPIC)

Jesus taught freedom from oppression and to love the search for the presence of God's reign in our lives and the universe. Since Pope Leo XIII's 1891 letter on the Condition of Workers, church teaching has faced many social issues so that individual compassion flows through to both growing just structures and dismantling the structure of sin. Treating the earth with respect is within this continuum. (*Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church* 2004).

Lectionary's Hidden Voices

The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy mandated that the treasures of the Bible are to be opened up more lavishly (#51). In 1969 a new order of Readings (Lectionary) was published with a three year cycle of Sunday Readings.

Greeting

Lectionary's Hidden Voices

The revision of the lectionary was mandated by Vatican II. In 1969, a new three year cycle of Sunday Readings was promulgated replacing a one year cycle.

Prophecy is a major part of the Scripture showing the consequences of human action. The voice of Earth as Prophet can be heard in the increasing frequency of severe weather or extinction of species as oceans warm, consequences of our actions. We must not suppress this gift of God the way the Lectionary overlooks the voice of women.

There is no Sunday Reading about Deborah. (Jud 5:1-31) Verses 15-19 about Huldah the prophet are omitted from the Lectionary passage. (2 Kings 22:8-13; 23:1-3)

Church Teachings

Education offices in most states have produced a local edition of *On Holy Ground* www.catholicearthcare.org.au It is of value to all Catholics.

First published by Catholic Earthcare Australia its method is deceptively simple – a vision, the supporting context of Catholic tradition, implementing and sustaining the vision.

Ecological Insight

Every few years the government publishes *State of the Environment Australia*. It collates scientific reports for all states to better clarify trends affecting the entire nation. It was last published in 2011.

It begins by saying that Australians cannot afford to see themselves as separate from the environment. It points to areas of progress but warns that changing climate and ocean conditions will require quick and major national responses. Coastal areas will require coordinated management. www.environment.gov.au

What can I do?

Some parishes have formed an environmental group. A group might begin by discussing a local problem or sharing personal environmental concerns, then use the See-Judge-Act method to organise ideas and concerted action.

Season of Creation

The Season of Creation runs during the Sundays of September. Scripture scholars drew on social justice principles. <http://seasonofcreation.com>

Much injustice in western cultures sprang from dualistic philosophy - reason/feeling; civilised/primitive; sacred/profane. Six Eco-justice Principles were created (Readings from the Perspective of Earth ed. NC Habel 2000, *Pilgrim Press*) - a summary:

1. Intrinsic worth – the earth and all its parts has value, not a place of 'exile'.
2. Interconnectedness – a community of mutually dependent life, not merely for our 'use and benefit'.
3. Voice – earth can raise its voice in celebration and against injustice, not a 'passive object'.
4. Purpose – a dynamic cosmic design with all parts contributing to a goal, not aimless.
5. Mutual Custodianship – responsible custodians function as partners to sustain a balanced diversity, not 'rulers'.
6. Resistance – earth actively resists abuse, not a passive 'helpless victim'.

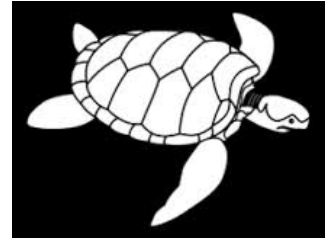
Lectionary's Hidden Voices

Saying *Mother Earth* is a common way of speaking for indigenous peoples. The metaphor captures the reality that the earth embraces and nurtures us, is resilient and persists in caring for us. We must not forget the stories of nurturing and courageous women in the Scriptures.

The midwives Shiphrah and Puah defied the pharaoh's law (Ex 1:8-22). Esther bravely pleaded to save her people from annihilation. (Esther 4:16) Judith was another heroine. (Judith 8:2- 8) These passages are not in the Sunday Lectionary. In a parallel way, we often fall short in recognising Mother Earth.

Church Teaching

In 1971 Pope Paul VI was first to publish on environmental issues (*Eighty Years*). St Pope John Paul II developed Catholic Teaching when he gathered religious leaders to Assisi in 1986. Care for earth was a call common to all humanity and religions. Pope John Paul's II 1990 New Year Message outlined the main issues and he chose St Francis as the Patron Saint of the Environment. He and following Popes have detailed the Catholic call to *ecological conversion* and to fulfil an ecological vocation. Pope Benedict XVI called for 'a new understanding of the inseparability of Creation and Redemption'. (20.08.08)

Season of Creation

The Season of Creation runs during the Sundays of September. Combining the insights of ecology and scriptural scholarship reveals deeper meanings in the Lord's Prayer. The Lord's Prayer was written within an ancient three tiered cosmos. Astronomy now shows that the image of a split between heaven and earth is false. God is present and active on earth establishing the Reign of God.

Petitions in the Lord's Prayer are about bread, debt and our being put on trial. Earth is our focus if we believe all people and species need food; our overuse of earth resources put us into a debt which must be paid; un-serviceable loans and over-development test nature's life support systems and put us on trial.

Injustice towards the life giving cycle of water on earth takes many forms. Overseas there are Australian companies competing in Chile and elsewhere to control rights over water. In Australia we often mismanage water resources, be it the Murray Darling Basin or the Great Artesian Basin. The impact of mining and the chemicals used in coal seam drilling often pollute rivers or aquifers essential for agriculture.

Lectionary's Hidden Voices

Earth serves humanity as a teacher and leader. Natural systems of atmospheric winds and ocean currents, changing seasons and slowly evolving genetics are the context for human life. Earth teaches us to plan within its limits, showing what does and does not work.

The Lectionary often leaves out the teaching and leadership role of women. In the continuous reading from Romans, Phoebe as deaconess is omitted. During the Easter Sundays the sending of Mary Magdalene as a messenger to the disciples is left out. (John 20:17) These omissions alert us to look for the teaching role of the earth in God's plans.

Church Teaching and Belief

Ecological Insight

The CSIRO has been an iconic research unit for nearly a century. Its science shows that rivers and coastal systems are under pressure from their misuse and climate fluctuations; groundwater dependent ecosystems are at risk. At stake are deteriorating water quality, modified natural habitats, disrupted food webs, and reduced ecosystem services.

The CSIRO's Catchment Biogeochemistry and Aquatic Ecology Research Program collects the scientific knowledge to form management strategies to protect and improve Australia's aquatic systems. Research focuses on how the basic life forms of ecosystems interact in rivers, floodplains, wetlands, water storages and estuaries. www.csiro.au

What can I do?

- Contact your local water management authorities to find out what they do.
- Contact Caritas about overseas water aid projects.
- Find out about Pacific islands losing their fresh water lagoons.
