Militarism and the arms industry

This is the third in a series of eight pamphlets offered by the Columban Centre for Peace, Ecology and Justice focusing on peace and active non-violence.

'These will hammer their swords into ploughshares, their spears into sickles. Nation will not lift sword against nation, there will be no more training for war'. Is 2:4s

God's vision for the world is one of harmony and right relationship where peace can flourish and human beings reach their full potential unhindered by conflict or violence.

The arms industry is one of the largest industries in the world. Billions are spent on the research and development of more deadly and sophisticated ways of killing people and destroying the environment. Militarism is promoted as necessary for defence and most nation states regard war as an acceptable tool of foreign policy. Many western nations are economically reliant on the 'industrial military machine'. The arms industry needs wars to keep it functioning.

Corrupt governments and people are given easy access to arms, which helps keep them in power and profits the arms manufacturers.

The majority of conflicts currently taking place are, in fact, within nations rather than between nations, eg. Sudan, Ethiopia, Colombia, Venezuela, Palestine, and are the target of small arms dealers the small arms industries are among the most destructive with landmines being the worst culprit. Women and children are usually the first victims.

Armed response to conflict teaches a defence consciousness that will only disappear through global disarmament.

While the Christian tradition has long held to the principles of a 'just war', in the face of new and ever more deadly modern weaponry, increasingly these traditional reasons are no longer valid. Therefore the argument for a 'just war' is difficult to defend. The catastrophic consequences are too great for the future of the planet and all its peoples.

'Peace results from that harmony built into human society by its divine founder and actualised by people as they thirst after ever greater justice' (Vatican II, Gaudium et Spes, #78).

Peace must be born of mutual trust between nations rather than imposed on them through fear of one another's weapons.



She is involved in many committees and groups whose aims are disarmament and peace. Among the awards she has received in recognition of her peacemaking are Member of the Order of Australia, and the 1998 RSL Peace Prize.

FACT FILE

- In the past 10 years:
 - 2 million children have been killed in conflict;
 - 4-5 million children have been disabled;
 - 12 million children have been left homeless;
 - 300,000 children have been recruited as soldiers in active combat.
- Global military expenditure for 2002 exceeded \$US800 billion dollars.
- **Top spenders were:**
